Schedule and Guide to Putney Bridge Area

Schedule

Welcome Drinks | Thursday, September 19, 6 pm

The Antelope, 22 Eaton Terrace, Belgravia

Get there by taking District line eastward and getting off at Sloane Square station (25 min) or 22 bus east toward Piccadilly Circus getting off at Cadogan Gardens Sloane Square (30 min). From the northeast corner of Sloane Square walk east down Sloane Square road which becomes Cliveden Place, then make the first left onto Eaton Terrace. See page 74 of your A-Z map.

Ceremony | Saturday, September 21, 3 pm (please arrive early)

The Queen's Club, Palliser Road, West Kensington

Get there by taking District line eastward and getting off at Earl's Court station to transfer to either the District line toward Ealing or Richmond, or Piccadilly line toward Heathrow. From either the District or Piccadilly lines get off at Barons Court station. As you leave Barons Court station, exit right and then continue straight ahead all the way to the end of Palliser Road. See page 86 of your A-Z map.

We'll be ending the night at The Depot, Mortlake High Street, Barnes where you can get the N22 back to Putney Bridge or a mini cab can be ordered for you.

Brunch | Sunday, September 22, 12 pm noon (for those free)

Moomba, 5 Lacy Road, Putney

Get there by crossing Putney Bridge, walking down Putney High Street and making a right onto Lacy Road. Takes 8 min to walk. See page 100 of your A-Z map.

Putney Bridge area

You're in Fulham, but once you cross Putney Bridge you're in Putney. The second permanent bridge in London was built between Fulham and Putney in 1729 (only after London Bridge). Fulham is within easy reach of locations like Chelsea and Kensington and by London standards you're in Jim and Joe's neighborhood (30 min walk away). The King's Road through Chelsea which becomes New King's Road in Fulham, then Putney Bridge Approach was once a private road for royalty to get to palaces south of the River Thames. Getting around by Tube

Putney Bridge station is located on the Wimbledon branch of the District line. You can travel directly into the city using the District line including places like South Kensington, St. James Park (Buckingham Palace), Westminster (Parliament, Westminster Abbey), Embankment (Trafalgar Square), Mansion House (St Paul's Cathedral), Tower Hill (Tower Bridge often confused as London Bridge).

Remember when you're returning to Putney Bridge get the Wimbledon branch back. Otherwise, you'll need to change at Earl's Court station. You can transfer at Earl's Court to the Piccadilly line, for Knightsbridge, Green Park, Leicester Square, Covent Garden, King's Cross, etc.

Last Tube is at approximately midnight, but many buses run throughout night.

Key bus routes

14 - Goes down Fulham Road, through South Kensington including the Natural History Museum and V&A, Knightsbridge including Harrods, Hyde Park Corner, Piccadilly Circus, ending relatively close to Regent's Park

22 - Follows the King's Road through Chelsea, Knightsbridge including Harrods, Hyde Park Corner, Green Park, Piccadilly Circus. This is also the N22 route you can take on Saturday night from the reception to Putney Bridge as it runs all night.

74 - Heads in the direction of where Jim and Joe live, through Earl's Court, Hyde Park Corner, Marble Arch, Oxford Street, Baker Street, Regent's Park

You have to hail buses at bus stops; they don't automatically stop. See attached map.

Nearby attractions (see pages 86 or 100 of your A-Z map)

Fulham Palace* / Bishop's Park

From the 11th century to 1975 it was home to London's Bishop and still owned by the Church of England. There's now a museum of the palace's history and botanical garden in the surrounding grounds.

Craven Cottage, Fulham FC

Craven Cottage was originally a royal hunting lodge, but has been home to Fulham Football Club since 1896 and is one of the smallest Premiership stadiums. Fulham plays Chelsea at Stamford Bridge on the 21st so you'll likely run into fans.

Hurlingham Club*

An exclusive sports and social club featuring Georgian architecture. On Saturday you can participate in a tour at 11 am through Open House London (you should arrive 15 mins early). There's some rivalry between the Queen's Club where the ceremony will take place and Hurlingham Club. Few before have gone to both in the same day!

Hurlingham Park

A sports ground best known for Monty Python's Upper Class Twit of the Year Sketch.

All Saints Church*

There has been a church on this site for more than 900 years where many former bishops have been buried. Putney Bridge is the only bridge in Britain with a church on either side. On the Putney side you can find the ancient St. Mary's Church.

* Denotes there is free public access Saturday 21st and Sunday 22nd for the annual Open House London weekend.

Pubs

The Eight Bells, 89 Fulham High Street - 1 min walk (behind Premier Inn)

The Bricklayers Arms, 32 Waterman Street - 'village like' pub with 'real ales' - 8 min walk crossing bridge (just off Putney High Street)

Duke's Head, 8 Lower Richmond Road - pub with food on river - 8 min walk crossing bridge (immediate right)

Half Moon, 52 Lower Richmond Road - pub with food and live music - 10 min walk crossing bridge (immediate right)

Food

Byron, 22 Putney High Street - Joe's favorite burger joint, can find throughout London - 5 min walk crossing bridge

La Pizzica, 764 Fulham Road - good place for Italian or a pizza - 6 min walk northeast

Roxie Steak & Wine Cafe, 803 Fulham Road - nice place for a steak dinner - 13 min walk northeast

Amenities

Sainsbury's Grocery Store, 915 Fulham Road - 8 min walk northeast

Waitrose Grocery Store, Exchange Shopping Centre, Putney High Street - 8 min walk crossing bridge

Barclays Bank, 60 Putney High Street - no fees for Bank of America customers - 7 min walk crossing bridge

Tinto Coffee, 411 Fulham Palace Road - 8 min walk north

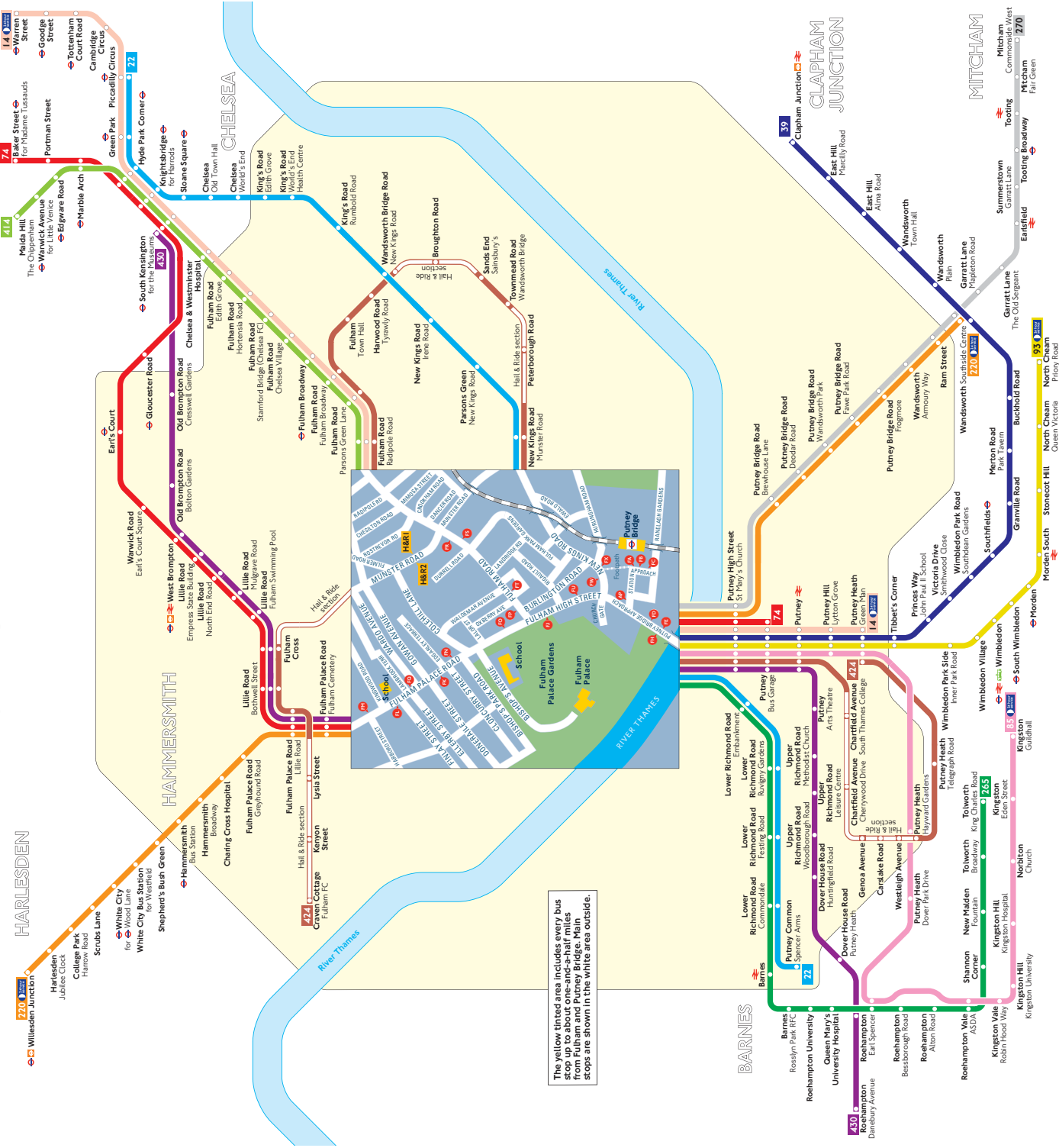
McDonald's, 84 Putney High Street - 7 min walk crossing bridge
